## SCHOOL WEEKEND FOOD BAGS

Glastonbury Links Together has committed to providing weekend sacks for children in elementary schools again this year. At the end of last year, we were asked if we would consider also providing bags for Eastbury and Naubuc schools for the 24/25 school year. (Previously Naubuc ran their own program under a grant with extra contributions from St. Mark.) We agreed to do this. This will, however, double the number of bags that need to be





prepared each week (from 30 to 60+). Each bag contains 2 single serve breakfasts, fruit, snacks and meals. Each week a member of Glastonbury Links Together is responsible for providing the food, packing and delivering the bags. There is a box in the Narthex for donations. ## Missions Committee – Jan Frick

The St. Mark Endowment Committee informed the Missions Committee that this year's disbursement from the Endowment Fund would be \$2,500. Pursuant to the guidelines for designating groups/beneficiaries of this amount, the Missions Committee has recommended the following which will be presented to the church Council at its August 28th meeting.

Local community organizations:

\$500 to Manchester Area Conference of Churches (MACC)

\$250 to Carol's Closet at St. James Episcopal Church in Glastonbury

\$150 to The Cornerstone Food Pantry in Vernon

Regional/New England Synod Ministries: \$500 to Lutheran World Relief \$200 to Calumet Lutheran Ministries

Global/ELCA Ministries:

\$700 to ELCA's 150th Anniversary for World Hunger

\$200 to Global Refuge (previously known as Lutheran Immigration Refugee Services)

Separate from the Endowment Fund disbursement, the Missions Committee will also be making a \$150 contribution to the Glastonbury FISH organization. This contribution

will be made from Scrip Card proceeds. Do make yourself a note to order Scrip cards early for the upcoming holidays. You can also talk with Leslie O'Rourke about ordering and even purchasing available Scrip cards that she has. All Scrip card purchases help to generate funds that can be used for Missions activities.

For this Fall and Advent, the Missions Committee will be looking to the congregation for their support of three projects that have become vital outreach efforts on behalf of our community and beyond.

- October: We will again partner with Thrivent in collecting non-perishable food items for "Feed Northeast". Last year, St. Mark's collected over 600 items which were donated to Manchester Area Conference of Churches (MACC). We're hoping to top that amount this year.

- November: We will again partner with Seafarers Ministry to provide personal items for ship crews for Christmas. Last year, we raised funds that provided 16 satchels to ship crew members that would be away from their families over the holidays.

- December: We will again partner with Community Child Guidance Clinic (CCGC) in Manchester to provide students with age appropriate and skills compatible activity kits for Christmas. Last year, we raised funds that were used to purchase art themed kits for the students, and they really loved them.

Please see me if you have an idea of something to celebrate over tea.

POTLUCK SUPPERS: A repeat of the Chili cook-off with a different theme, maybe meatball cook-off, or international potluck, or Advent/Christmas potluck, or make your own pizzas—bring a crust, add ingredients you pick fresh from the pizza garden. Other ideas? It is an opportunity to make health kits at these potlucks.

#### The Pollinator Garden

This photo was taken by Pr. Hoffman and used on the cover of the August 25 Bulletin. It displays the primary uses for swamp milkweed. The garden has some interesting features:

- The garden is designed to be enjoyed from the inside windows in the Pastor's study and in the Office Manager's office. Feel free to take a walk around the west wing and get the full effect too.
- A rain barrel has been installed to both fill the fountain basin and water the plants. This means that no Town of Glastonbury water has been used to maintain the garden. Thanks again to Jule Beers.



- A plaque from the Lady Bird Johnson wildflower farm and museum in Austin, Texas has been donated by Deb Gresens. It emphasizes the need for pollinators in a beautiful way.
- The bee motel is ready for occupancy.
- Plant tabs have been added to identify the 19 species we have growing.
- A plant list including the common name, Latin name, and plant description is available for your edification.
- The fountain uses solar power, eliminating the need for electricity. The fountain has a steady trickle of water instead of a spray to enable bees and butterflies to drink easily.
- The top layer of mulch is arborists mulch which contains no dyes or other treatments. It is very effective at blocking weeds, and also has an under-layer of shredded recycling, which helps to keep maintenance to a minimum.
- No herbicides, pesticides, or fertilizers have been used to maintain this garden, making it



totally organic.

Thank you so much to everyone who helped put this together, beginning with this committee and the Missions committee, who helped with approval of the initial garden plan and securing Thrivent grants. Thank you to Church Council for their input and guidance. Thank you to the Property guys for their enlightening advice. Thank you to Ronald Kraatz for help with digging and leveling the fountain and mounting the decorative items. Thank you to Pr. Hoffman and Ellen Topel Dougherty, especially for the bottles of cold water, recycled paper, and good advice. It takes a village. Blessed be God who is our bread; may all the world be clothed and fed.

## Installation of Bishop Nathan Pipho



The Rev. Nathan D. Pipho will be installed as the fourth bishop of the New England Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) at a Festive Holy Eucharist on Saturday, September 7, 2024 at 1:00 p.m. at Trinity Lutheran Church, 73 Lancaster Street, Worcester, MA. The Rev. Elizabeth Eaton, Presiding Bishop of the ELCA, will preside and a reception in Trinity's Jeppson Hall will follow. The public is invited to attend. The liturgy will also be livestreamed at www.vimeo.com/trinityworcester. If anyone from St. Mark is interested in attending in person, please contact Pastor Hoffman.

Bishop Pipho was elected to a six-year term on June 7 by the New England Synod Assembly meeting at the DCU Center in Worcester. At the time of his election, he had been serving as the pastor of Trinity Lutheran Church, Worcester, Massachusetts. He began ministry at Trinity on All Saints Day in 2016. In addition to all aspects of parish ministry, he served as Secretary of the Board of Worcester Interfaith and as Protestant Chaplain at Worcester Polytechnic Institute (WPI).

Prior to his ministry in Worcester, he served as pastor of Good Shepherd Lutheran Church in North Quincy, Massachusetts from 2002 to 2015. He helped establish a Chinese outreach ministry under the direction of the Rev. Ryan Lun, served as internship supervisor for the Rev. Tiffany Chaney and was a founding member and first President of Quincycles Bicycle advocacy group. He also served as President of the Interchurch Council of Wollaston and North Quincy.

He has been active in the life New England Synod by serving as a member of the Antiracism Advisory Board, the New England Synod Candidacy Committee, Chair of the Synod Team for Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual, and Transgender Inclusion, and Dean of the Boston Metro Conference. He was a voting member of the 2009 ELCA Churchwide Assembly and was elected at the 2019 ELCA Churchwide Assembly to serve a six-year term on the ELCA Committee on Discipline.

He was ordained on St. Michael & All Angels Day in 2002 at St. John Lutheran Church, Sudbury, Massachusetts by the Rev. Margaret Payne, 2nd Bishop of the New England Synod. He completed his internship at the Lutheran Church of the Redeemer, Woburn, Massachusetts. He earned a Bachelor of Arts degree from Wartburg College, Waverly, Iowa in 1998 and a Master of Divinity degree from the Lutheran Theological Seminary at Philadelphia (now United Lutheran Seminary) in 2002. He earned a Master in Public Administration degree from the Harvard Kennedy School in Cambridge, Massachusetts in 2016.


There's lots of sharing during the weekend and plenty of laughing. At the end of each day, some time is carved out for some inspirational devotions.

# The Synod's AntiRacism Advisory Board, in partnership with Calumet, invites you to save the date for our next book discussion

Jim Wallis, well respected theologian, teacher and author of a dozen books, has recently released *The False White Gospel: Rejecting Christian Nationalism, Reclaiming True Faith, and Refounding Democracy.* The New York Times bestselling author and director of the Center for Faith and Justice at Georgetown University, addresses the dangers of White Christian Nationalism and issues a call to action for Christians to reclaim the gospel of Jesus. The Antiracism Advisory Board's education team has chosen this text for our next discussion.

We will be discussing this book on the evening of Monday, October 28 and the morning of Tuesday, October 29. The book is widely available through commercial retailers. A generous donor has provided funds to purchase 100 copies of the book. This initiative is funded in part by a I Have a Dream grant from the New England Synod.


